

# Raymond Burley

AYMOND BURLEY is one of the UK's most experienced and versatile guitarists having performed solo concerts, concertos, on film scores, radio and television and in virtually every guitar ensemble combination.

As a soloist he has toured extensively throughout the UK, Europe, North and South America and the Far East and has appeared many times at London's Wigmore Hall, Purcell Room, Queen Elizabeth Hall and Symphony Hall in Birmingham. He has performed and recorded with many of England's finest orchestras including the BBC Symphony, the Philharmonia, English Chamber Orchestra and the Royal Philharmonic.

Raymond has given premieres of works by composers that include Stephen Dodgson, David Gow, Bernard Stevens, Reginald Smith Brindle, Christopher Wright, John Duarte, Raymond Head, Edmundo Vasquez, James Patten, Bryan Kelly, Elis Pehkonen, Dudley Moore and John Scott.

He has worked in guitar duos with John Mills, Gilbert Biberian, John Feeley, Gregg Nestor and Alice Artzt and is currently a member of the quartet *4 Parts Guitar* with jazz guitarist John Etheridge and steel string guitarists Gordon Giltrap and Clive Carroll. Other partnerships include violinist Emanuel Salvador, harpsichordist Gilbert Rowland, percussionist Keith Fairbairn, keyboard player Rick Wakeman and actress Dame Peggy Ashcroft.

Raymond has given masterclasses and directed summer schools and festivals in the UK, Vancouver, Ottawa, Toronto, Princeton, Calgary, Seattle, San Francisco, Salt Lake City, Washington DC, New York, Kowloon, Dublin, Bonn, Bremen and Lima.

He has many recordings and publications to his credit.
